The Margaret McNamara Memorial Fund (MMMMF) provides grants to women from developing countries to help further their education and strengthen their leadership skills to improve the lives of women and children in developing countries. Initially, MMMF grants were awarded to students enrolled, at the time they submitted their applications, at accredited institutions in the United States or Canada. In 2008, the MMMF started providing grants to students at the University of Cape Town and University of Pretoria in South Africa. The MMMF considers applicants who are at least 25 years of age, demonstrate a commitment to women and children, and plan to return to their countries within about two years after completing studies financed by the grants.

The MMMF was founded in 1981 in honor of Margaret Craig McNamara's life-long commitment to women and children and her advocacy of education. The MMMF is affiliated with the World Bank Family Network and, except for one staff member, all are volunteers. The Board of Directors makes policy and raises funds; Selection Committees process applications; and separate Selection Panels select candidates who are presented to the Board for final approval. Since 1983, the MMMF has awarded 186 grants, totaling over \$1.6 million, to women from 61 developing countries. The MMMF is a tax-exempt, not-for-profit public charity based in Washington, D.C. Contributions are tax deductible in the US to the extent permitted by law under section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

# THE MARGARET McNAMARA MEMORIAL FUND® President's Report



The MMMF is celebrating its 30th anniversary in 2011. The anniversary has inspired action on several initiatives: a mission statement reaffirming our goals and purpose; an upgraded website; the registration of our name and logo; an update of MMMF's history; our first professional video; and a "birthday gift" to ourselves in the form of two additional educational grants, which raised to 19 our total 2010-11 grants, the most we have awarded in a year. This included a memorial grant established in 2010 and funded by friends of Leila Zlaoui, the late World Bank staff member and MMMF donor.

In addition, the basic tasks that MMMF volunteers perform every year, with our Coordinator's support, were all successful: two fundraising activities – the International Arts and Crafts Fair and the MMMF Friends campaign – and two grant recipient selection processes, one for South African and one for North American universities. To accomplish these actions Georgine Ahmad, Kris Martin and Caroline Berney took the lead on the MMMF Fair, Nadereh Chamlou and Christine Stover solicited MMMF Friends, and Elna van Greuning and Vesna de la Borde chaired the Selection Committees for South Africa and North America, respectively. Board Treasurer Jayati Datta Mitra's handling of the MMMF's investments and finances and Board Secretary Kris Martin's work on keeping the Board focused on outcomes contributed crucially to the smooth running of the organization. Six Board members worked on the communications and marketing initiative to produce the new MMMF video for which special recognition goes to Andree Wynkoop and Dominique Lallement. MMMF's Coordinator, our only staff member, who plays an essential role in day-to-day operations, changed this year. Cecile Ferri resigned in December to move to Africa, and her successor, Martina Adank, very ably ensured a seamless transition and continues to improve systems and processes.

Three Board members are departing: outgoing Vice-President Georgine Ahmad, an all-around whirlwind volunteer; Gilda Dadush, who resigned in the fall but forged ahead with the website upgrade; and Betty Rice who, though with the MMMF a short time, brought many fresh ideas. We will miss them all, but thanks to our Nominating Committee, headed by Joanne Garrity, we welcomed Elna van Greuning as a new Board member.

I thank the World Bank and the World Bank Family Network for their invaluable support. I would also like to express my profound appreciation to our loyal volunteers, the MMMF Coordinators, advisors, and members of the Board.

# ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE MMMF IN 2011

---

## Selection of MMMF Grant Recipients

The South African regional program, initiated in 2007, and now fully integrated into the MMMF's work, requires a separate time table to conform to that country's academic year and a separate Selection Committee and Panel. In 2010, this selection team, chaired by Elna van Greuning, and composed of 22 members from 13 countries, proposed eight finalists for presentation to the Board. The Board approved six grantees from four African countries studying in the Universities of Pretoria and Cape Town.

For women studying in the US and Canada, the Selection Committee was headed by Vesna de la Borde and included 15 members from 10 countries. The Selection Panel, which makes the final proposal to the MMMF Board, consisted of five Committee members plus five World Bank staff/retirees. The Board approved thirteen grants for women from eleven countries.

## 2011 MMMF Grantee Events

In February 2011, an award ceremony was held in Pretoria to recognize the South African grantees and hear their stories. Ruth Kagia, World Bank Country Director for South Africa, provided the opening address.

In May 2011, the US/Canada grantees came to Washington, D.C., for three days of events. These events resulted in a valuable exchange of knowledge and insights. The highlight was a forum where each grantee spoke about her research and plans for continuing her work with women and children after receiving her degree. The grantees also met the MMMF Board and Selection Committee members; attended sessions with health and education specialists from the World Bank, Development Gateway and Results for Development Institute; attended the annual WBFN dinner; and made friends with each other. Over time, these annual events have increasingly emphasized networking and knowledge sharing experiences. A 30th Anniversary celebration was held during the recipients' visit. This important MMMF milestone was celebrated by our supporters from the World Bank staff and the WBFN and MMMF communities.

## 2010-11 Fundraising Efforts

In November 2010, the 25th MMMF International Arts and Crafts Fair was held for the first time in the Preston Auditorium. Once again, dozens of vendors offered beautiful items during the three-day Fair, which was supported by many volunteers. Overall, the Fair brought in almost \$50,000.

The annual request for donations from Friends of MMMF also raised almost \$50,000 for MMMF programs. Thanks to generous individuals who have repeatedly responded to donation requests, the Friends campaign, begun in 1993 by Bank staff committed to the MMMF's mission, has generated almost \$600,000 over the years and allowed expansion of the grant program to many more women.

In addition to a significant donation from the Bank-Fund Staff Federal Credit Union, the MMMF gratefully received generous contributions from World Bank staff members in lieu of retirement celebrations.



## Other Contributions

The MMMF benefitted from the time and efforts of many volunteers this past year. In addition, the World Bank again generously provided space, communications and administrative support through the World Bank Family Network and also through in-kind donations of printing and graphics services. The law firm of WilmerHale assisted with the registration of the MMMF's name and logo in 2010 and continued to provide pro-bono legal services.

Eman Abd Elrahman Ahmad Abu Sabbah,  
Jordan - Leila Zlaoui Memorial Grantee  
Ph.D. Nursing Science; University at Buffalo,  
State University of NY

Ms. Abu Sabbah's thesis relates to the efficacy of cognitive behavioral therapy in reducing suffering among abused Jordanian women. She is concerned about how society's "tolerance of repeated abuse" affects the well-being of both women and children and of society as a whole. Ms. Abu Sabbah hopes that her thesis will develop intervention methods to help empower women and alleviate their psychological burden. After completing her degree, she will continue her academic career at the University of Jordan, work with human rights institutions and NGOs, and help promote changes in policies and laws

to improve the lives of abused Jordanian women.



Oluwatoyin Adewunmi Adeleke, Nigeria  
Master's Public Health; University of Cape  
Town

Ms. Adeleke's thesis will assess the quality of existing obstetric health care services and identify the barriers that impede access. She has been actively involved in field work to train women of child-bearing age to manage diarrhea; UNICEF peer educator training of adolescents on HIV prevention and reproductive health; and volunteering for indigenous women's organizations. On completing her M.A., she plans to return home to increase opportunities in such areas as small and medium scale entrepreneurship for women in selected communities. Her strategies will also include working with health organizations to advocate

for the right to health, health promotion, and education.



Fafanyo Asiseh, Ghana -  
Sukriye Karaosmanoglu Grantee  
Ph.D. Development & Health Economics;  
Washington State University

Ms. Asiseh's dissertation investigates how cultural and social factors influence the spread, prevention, and treatment of sexually transmitted diseases in Sub-Saharan Africa. She firmly believes that "education is an effective weapon to overcome all barriers in society." Ms. Asiseh has volunteered extensively to improve the lot of women and children in rural areas and to educate women on HIV/AIDS. She has also published in academic peer-reviewed journals. On completing her doctorate, Ms. Asiseh plans to become a lecturer, teaching economics and development in Ghana, and to continue to

conduct and publish research, on health and cultural norms, to contribute to policy formulation.

**Consodyne Mukama Buzabo, Uganda -**  
BFSFCU Grantee

Master's Transformative Arts; John F. Kennedy University

Ms. Buzabo's thesis will investigate the therapeutic role of the arts for healing, reconciling, and reintegrating former child soldiers and their families into Ugandan society. She has been touched by the lives of orphans in Uganda, and strongly believes in Mother Theresa's observation: "Being unwanted, unloved, uncared for, forgotten by everybody, I think that is a much greater hunger, a much greater poverty, than a person who has nothing to eat." Inspired by her parents' example, Ms. Buzabo is trying to develop a socio-emotional treatment model for former child soldiers and

their families. On completing her master's, she plans to pursue a career as a teacher and counselor/therapist in Uganda and to promote the inclusion of the expressive arts in the school curriculum as therapy for the psychological traumas of war and poverty.



**Sígilia Pimentel Höher Camargo, Brazil**

Ph.D. Education; Texas A&M University

Ms. Camargo's thesis investigates the effectiveness of visual script interventions in helping autistic preschool children to initiate interaction with their peers in free play activities in inclusive school settings. She has dedicated her life to psychology, working with mothers and children with disabilities from low-income families and with pregnant women whose babies were pre-diagnosed with disabilities. On completing her Ph.D. and a parallel certification in behavior analysis, Ms. Camargo plans to work as a university professor or researcher in Brazil in applied behavioral analysis to help children with autism and other developmental disabilities.



**Weiwei Chen, China**

Ph.D. Education; University of California Santa Barbara

Ms Chen's thesis focuses on how general education teachers as well as parents of children with disabilities in China perceive the impact of inclusive education. After obtaining her master's in linguistics in China, she enrolled in three European Universities to study for a master's in clinical linguistics. She has worked with autistic children and compiled a behavior management textbook for teacher training. On her return to China, she plans to conduct research on special education to lay the groundwork for inclusion to take off in China.

**Goodness Chioma Aye, Nigeria**

Ph.D. Agricultural Economics; University of Pretoria

Ms. Aye's thesis aims to identify the policy environment that would best enhance farmers' access to improved technology and production practices, improve efficiency and productivity, and eventually reduce poverty and inequality in Nigeria. She was part of a team that organized free literacy classes for youth preparing for secondary and tertiary education. She also organized free literacy classes for illiterate children of illiterate mothers. She plans to return to Nigeria and resume lecturing and gender research with the University of Agriculture, Makurdi. She plans to participate in developing and implementing pro-poor

agricultural policies and to ensure access for women farmers to improved technologies to increase their productivity and reduce poverty.



**Batool Fatima, Pakistan**

Ph.D. Public Health; Boston University, School of Public Health

Ms Fatima's thesis aims to identify the barriers to the access and use of mental health services by women in Pakistan. Since women's education was not a priority in Ms. Fatima's family, she had to struggle to fulfill her dream of being a psychologist. She was motivated by her mother's illness and by Jeremy Taylor's conclusion: "To preserve a man alive in the midst of so many chances and hostilities is as great a miracle as to create him." After completing her degree, Ms. Fatima will return to Pakistan to raise awareness of mental health issues, promote availability and women's access to mental health services, and advocate for the inclusion of mental health coverage in health insurance.



**Ambika Goel, India**

Ph.D. Mechanical Engineering; Massachusetts Institute of Technology

Ms. Goel's thesis investigates how nanotechnology can help create a low-cost drug delivery system for treating osteoarthritis. She volunteered in high school and college with her gynecologist mother in Delhi's slums to promote women's healthcare and sanitation but quickly realized that the approach was not sustainable: she understood the need for sustainable low-cost medical treatments for the underprivileged. After completing her Ph.D., Ms Goel plans to return to India to set up a research center to test and develop affordable drug delivery systems and ultimately to start a medical device company to bring affordable health care to the

underprivileged.

# RECIPIENTS OF MMMF GRANTS IN 2011



**Salmatta Abiodun Ibrahim, Sierra Leone**  
M.Sc. Geology; Clemson University

Ms. Ibrahim's thesis aims to develop tools and methods to help improve both water supply and water quality. She has wide professional experience, having worked as a Research Teaching Assistant at the University of Sierra Leone; a science teacher at the Ministry of Education in Sierra Leone; and an Administrator and Project Officer for Gender, Health, and Education issues. After completing her degree, Ms. Ibrahim plans to return to her teaching job at the University of Sierra Leone and to work with the Ministry of Education to introduce an earth science component into the school curriculum. She hopes to create a greater awareness of hydrology among female students

and to encourage them to become geoscientists.



**Gcinaphi Emily Mabuza-Sikhondze, Swaziland**  
M.Ed. Mathematics Studies; University of Pretoria

Ms. Mabuza-Sikhonde's thesis will investigate the views of high school mathematics teachers on learner-centered teaching, the extent to which they implement such teaching and the challenges they face. She has been a teacher for 10 years, volunteered after school hours and on weekends to teach weaker students, and found ways to help students who could not afford fees to stay in school. On her return to Swaziland, she hopes to secure a job with the Ministry of Education as an Inspector of Mathematics so she can encourage teachers to use the learner-centered approach.



**Gracious Madimutsa, Zimbabwe**  
M.A. Community Development; University of Pretoria

Ms. Madimutsa's thesis will analyze the responses of people in rural communities in Mutoko to Voluntary Counseling and Testing (VCT); their awareness of VCT, HIV and AIDS; and their attitudes towards HIV testing. She volunteered in an orphanage set up in response to the HIV/AIDS pandemic. She counseled orphans about HIV/AIDS and trained them in life skills. She strongly believes that the impact of HIV/AIDS can be reduced through research and behavioral change. On completing her M.A., she hopes to find a job in Zimbabwe, primarily in development research, and start a program to empower women and children.

**Truelove Simangele Mkhwanazi, South Africa**  
Ph.D. Education; University of Washington

Ms. Mkhwanazi's thesis deals with teacher development in the context of South African education reform. From her early childhood, Ms. Mkhwanazi was "encouraged to value education because I was always told that it would open closed doors for me." She has a master's in special education and has taught high school children in poor rural areas; worked as a volunteer school counselor; and founded a group, Teenagers against Pregnancy. She plans to return to South Africa to continue advocating for research and teacher development as potential starting points for transforming and improving education in South Africa.



**Elizabeth Beatrice Namazzi, Uganda**  
Ph.D. Curriculum Studies; University of British Columbia, Canada

Ms. Namazzi's thesis investigates the influence of cultural practices on high school students' perception of the spread and prevention of HIV/AIDS and its implications for high school curriculum and instruction in Uganda. Her passion for working with women and children stems from her own experience with the effects of political insurgencies on Uganda's population. She has more than 20 years of experience in education as a principal and lecturer and has dedicated 14 years of her life to patients with HIV/AIDS. On completing her doctorate, Ms. Namazzi plans to start a research program at Uganda Martyrs University to test and apply

effective interventions to improve the lives of the vulnerable.



**Albertina Maitumeleng Ntho-Ntho, Lesotho**  
Ph.D. Education Management, Law & Policy; University of Pretoria

Ms. Ntho-Ntho's study will interview school principals with different levels of education, from diverse schools across the country, and with diverse leadership backgrounds. They will participate in their private capacities, not as spokespersons for their schools. Ms. Ntho-Ntho has been a primary school teacher for 13 years and a role model for her students, colleagues, and the school community. She coordinated mentors in Pretoria University's mentorship program. On returning to Lesotho, she hopes to establish and manage a program to educate girls as well as the community about human rights, train and empower young women to take charge

of their lives, and encourage them to use contraceptives to avoid unwanted pregnancies and say "no" to unprotected sex and child labor. Ms. Ntho-Ntho also plans to mobilize funding for children's and women's education.

Nuning Suliasih Purwaningrum, Indonesia -  
MMMF 30th Anniversary Grantee  
Ph.D. Global Gender Studies; University at  
Buffalo, State University of NY

Ms. Purwaningrum's dissertation, a continuation of her master's thesis, aims to measure the social, economic, and political significance of mixed marriages in Indonesian society. Though her bachelor's was in Japanese letters (involving a two-year stay in Japan for language training), she did her master's in women's studies. For nine years, she advocated for families of mixed marriages, and her research and recommendations influenced the 2006 amendment to the Indonesian Citizenship Laws. On returning to her country, Ms. Purwaningrum plans to teach at the University of Indonesia and

work as a gender expert with NGOs, government, or the House of Representatives to help achieve policy change and social reform.



Ivy Rukasha, Zimbabwe -  
MMMF 30th Anniversary Grantee  
M.Sc. Medical Microbiology; University of  
Pretoria

The aim of Ms. Rukasha's thesis is to find the link between HIV and *T. vaginalis*. She will also investigate why more women than men present symptoms of sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) and why the response to treatment differs among individuals. She understood from a young age the importance of education, especially for women. For her thesis, she is working solely with HIV-positive women: women in Africa with STDs are often rejected and divorced for diseases that, more often than not, they did not bring into the family. On completing her studies, she plans to work at the

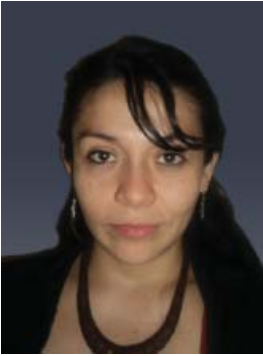
University of Zimbabwe as a researcher/lecturer on diseases affecting women.



Lin Shi, China - Charlotte Conable Grantee  
Master's International Affairs; Columbia  
University

Ms. Lin's thesis will analyze the causes, dynamics, and consequences of the challenges facing Chinese migrant children. As she says, "In the next 15 years, more than 200 million migrants will move to cities ... likely...result(ing) in various public health and socio-economic problems." Upon her return to China, she hopes to influence policies affecting Chinese internal migrants and to expand advocacy networks at both the national and regional levels. She also plans to establish an NGO offering pre-school education and basic health care for migrant children.

**Itzel Adriana Sosa Sánchez, Mexico**  
Ph.D. Sociology; Laval University, Canada

Ms. Sosa Sánchez's thesis aims to produce qualitative evidence useful to policymakers, activists, and NGOs for improving women's rights, reproductive and sexual health, and access to sexual health services. Ms. Sosa Sánchez believes "in the power of transformation and multiplicative impact of teaching and research-action." She has worked both online and through an NGO to teach young marginalized populations about sexuality and reproductive health. After completing her Ph.D., Ms. Sosa Sánchez plans to return to Mexico to continue her research. She aims to contribute to evidence-based social policy and program development to promote sexual and reproductive health as well

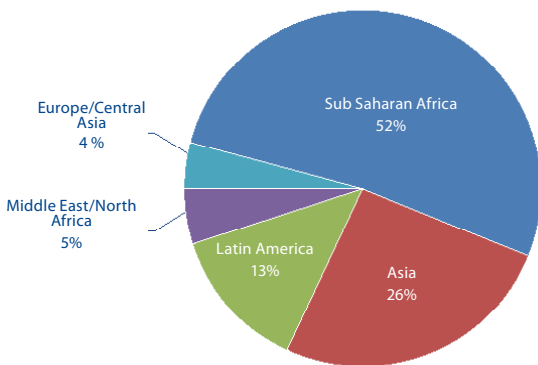
as access to health services.

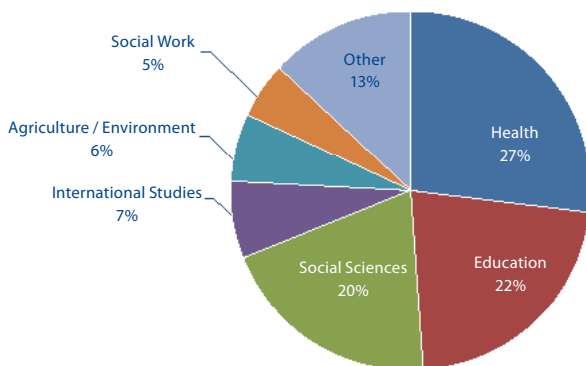
# MMMF RECIPIENTS 1983-2011
